Students earn college credits in high school

Guilherme “William” Sprowl is a typical busy high school student. He’s captain of the soccer team, active with clubs and has a school-related internship. He works part time and enjoys spending weekends with family and friends.

He also leads a double academic life, taking honor classes at Indianapolis Metropolitan High School and courses at Ivy Tech Community College.

William is one of 12 students at the public high school operated by Goodwill Education Initiatives taking college classes during the 2009-10 school year, part of the dual-credit I-ASPIRE College program.

I-ASPIRE College is one component of the school’s college preparation curriculum, which gives high school students

hands-on access to college and other post-secondary education options.

Students begin building a portfolio of their college prep work as freshmen. Regardless of their post-high school plans, every Indianapolis Met student is required to apply to at least three colleges or universities before graduation.

Students are encouraged to spend time on college campuses during summer immersion programs, campus visits, workshops and fairs offered throughout the year. Students at all grade levels participate in college prep activities, including classroom instruction on college choices, essay writing for admissions applications, SAT and ACT test prep and college culture.

P r e s i d e n t ' s M e s s a g e

Here's some good news from various parts of Goodwill:

We recently received another three-year accreditation from CARF International, the accrediting body that periodically surveys organizations such as ours.

In 2009, during a deep recession, our Commercial Services Division had one of its best years ever and added 28 employees, nearly all of whom have severe disabilities.

Goodwill's total employment of 2,180 persons now includes 727 with disabilities.

The recycling operations we launched in 2008 last year diverted 3.6 million pounds of product from the waste stream. We're able to be better stewards of the goods people donate to Goodwill and simultaneously be better stewards of the environment.



Graduation rates at the Indianapolis Metropolitan High School, the public charter high school Goodwill opened in 2004, are very encouraging. Despite the fact that most of our students come to us well behind where they should be academically and over 80% are from low income households, our five-year graduation rate is nearly equal to the statewide five-year rate for all public high schools and may even exceed that rate this year. In addition, 96% of our graduates have been accepted into a post-secondary institution, and after two years 69% are still enrolled or have completed a post-secondary course of study.

The school's new Ruth Lilly Science and Wellness Center is now in use and is a wonderful addition that will benefit our students for many years to come.

In addition, we continue to see many wonderful examples of individuals who have overcome immense barriers to achieve success in school or in the workforce. Their stories inspire us to continue striving to improve and to find economically sustainable ways to continue growing so we can provide similar opportunities for more people.

Of course, we also have our challenges. Health care costs rose sharply last year and are an ongoing concern. We also need to find additional resources that will enable us to build a gymnasium for the school. But we continue to be blessed with outstanding boards of directors, outstanding employees, and a wonderfully supportive community. We'll meet today's challenges and continue to work to further increase positive impact in the lives of people and in the communities in which we operate.

Indianapolis Met also administers a placement exam to students interested in enrolling in community college, sophomores and juniors take the PSAT, and the school this spring will begin administering the ACT exam to further increase students' access to higher education.

During the 2009-10 school year, students have taken college classes at Ivy Tech, Marian University and the Tucker School of Real Estate and have studied political science, sociology, psychology and English, among other courses, which are funded by the school. They have earned a total of 76 college credits.

"Not only are students earning dual credits, but our goal is to give them the academic support they need to be successful in their studies," said Tierree Smith, director of college transition services. "We want our students to gain survival skills like note taking and understanding campus culture that are necessary and helpful when they are college students."

Ninety-six percent of Indianapolis Met graduates have been accepted into post-secondary institutions, and after two years, 69% have completed or still are enrolled in a post-secondary course of study.

William, who has been accepted to attend six colleges, has decided to study chemical engineering at Rose-Hulman

Institute of Technology. He began taking college courses his junior year. He's studied physics, English and analytical geometry. When he graduates from Indianapolis Met this May, he will have 29 college credits.

"Being in a college classroom is great," William said. He spends 75 minutes Tuesdays and Thursdays in a calculus class at Ivy Tech. "The other students don't know I'm in high school, so when I'm able to answer questions in class or help someone who's having a problem, it's a good feeling," he said.

Senior Cory Bess began taking college classes his sophomore year. "Dual credit is more of a challenge because you still have to focus on your high school work so you can graduate and you have to do your college work so you can get the credits, but it's one of the best things I've been involved with here," he said.

Cory, who has been accepted to attend six different colleges, will take with him 27 credits.

"You absolutely have to work hard all the time, and it's sometimes tough to do both, but I'll have almost my entire freshman year of college done going into college. I'll be a step ahead, which is awesome."

Adult mentors needed to help teens

Adult volunteers are needed at Goodwill to help young people overcome disadvantages and avoid delinquency. The effort, launched in January, is part of a national initiative known as Goodwill GoodGuides™ that helps teens finish school and transition into productive careers through the guidance of adult mentors.

According to Kendall Price, program manager, "A crucial part of Goodwill's history of helping people is making sure that families are strong. GoodGuides™ can help keep youth who are at-risk get on the right path, away from trouble and toward a better future. That's good for everyone involved."

Youth who participate in GoodGuides™ will build career plans and skills and prepare for school completion, post-secondary training and productive work by engaging in structured and supportive relationships with trusted adult mentors. The service targets youth ages 12-17 who are least likely to have trusting relationships with adults due to risk

factors such as school failure, prior delinquency, family violence and other barriers.

"We will be able to offer expanded mentoring services to the youth of our community through GoodGuides™," Price said. "Goodwill will recruit, train and support volunteer mentors to engage youth in promoting their career development and life skills."

The GoodGuides™ service in central Indiana is made possible through a two-year, \$299,723 grant to Goodwill Industries of Central Indiana. The funding is part of a \$19.1 million award to Goodwill Industries International from the U.S. Department of Justice and dispersed to 56 independent Goodwill agencies around the country.

New science wing to prepare students for growing life sciences industry

Over the next decade, life sciences careers are expected to be among the fastest-growing industries in Indiana.

That's why leaders at Indianapolis Metropolitan High School are excited about the addition of a new science wing at the public high school operated by Goodwill Education Initiatives.

When students returned from winter break, they came back to the Ruth Lilly Science and Wellness Center, a \$1.36 million science wing funded by the Ruth Lilly Philanthropic Foundation.

"The Ruth Lilly Science and Wellness Center creates the physical space for our students to be exposed to the best science labs and technology and gives our highly qualified science teachers an opportunity to make science 'real' for our students," said Scott Bess, chief operating officer.

Sophomore advisor Kristen Engle, who majored in chemistry and life science at Michigan State University, agrees.

"Our students now have lab experiences that give them a deeper understanding of the concepts they have been discussing in class," she said. "The science wing also is bringing our teachers together to discuss these lab experiences to make our science program both engaging and rigorous for our students."

Features of the new science wing include a light and sound classroom where students are studying static electricity. In the greenhouse, students are growing fast-web plants for genetic studies.

A lab has high-tech computer workstations, and a breakout area includes a weather station, student project and multi-purpose labs for hands-on and lecture-style classes taught about the life, earth and biological sciences, as well as chemistry and physics. The space also includes a state-of-the-art wellness center.

"Having hands-on time in well-equipped labs gives our students an opportunity to see a world that they may not have known existed and prepares them for post-secondary education that leads to high-paying, secure employment," Bess said.

"We also believe students interested in the life sciences will be drawn to our school because the new science facility will allow them to enhance their studies with hands-on experiences," he added.

"Our research shows that the greatest opportunities for reducing environmental impact happen after consumers take their jeans home," said Robert Hanson, president of Levi Strauss Americas. "That is why we're excited to partner with Goodwill to let people know that they have a huge role in the climate change impact of their clothes.

Goodwill returns to Marion, relocates stores in Muncie and Indianapolis

Marion residents anxiously embraced the only Goodwill store in Grant County, located at 3164 S. Western Ave. The 14,000-square-foot store opened March 16 filled with more than 90,000 pieces of gently used merchandise, three checkout lanes and a donation drive-thru.

Hours for the new store are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday and noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday.

Due to growing public support, Goodwill shoppers can enjoy the convenience and size of two new Goodwill store relocations, one in Muncie and one on Indianapolis' northwest side.

The Muncie Store and the Goodwill store located at 8450 N. Michigan Road, Indianapolis, packed up their merchandise and moved into larger locations, which are both located behind the existing stores.

Employees at both locations made the transition to 16,000-square-foot stores, which are almost 6,000 square feet larger than each of the previous locations. In addition, the stores each have four checkout lanes and a double donation drive-thru center and employ 35 people.

The new Muncie Goodwill Store opened on Sept.22, followed by the opening of the Indianapolis store on Dec.8.
